DR. VICTORIA OYEWOLE

Class of 2018
Critical Care Pharmacy Resident
Detroit Medical Center



Dr. Victoria Oyewole is a member of the Class of 2018 from the University of Charleston School of Pharmacy. She is currently in a PGY2 residency as a Critical Care Pharmacy Resident at the Detroit Medical Center. Dr. Oyewole was attracted to Detroit's diverse patient mix and the hospital's progressive pharmacy practice. Her PGY2 research project explored the impact of methadone use for weaning patients on prolonged opioid infusions in the ICU, especially those with a history of opioid dependency or illicit IV drug use. Dr. Oyewole completed a PGY1 as a Pharmacy Practice Resident at the St. Joseph Medical Center Tacoma, Washington. During this year, she completed a research project on the prophylaxis of neonatal refeeding syndrome in intrauterine growth restricted neonates.

Dr. Oyewole was extremely involved as a student pharmacist at the University of Charleston. She was the Pharmacy Student Governance Association (PSGA) President and Parliamentarian. Dr. Oyewole was instrumental in consolidating the former Honors and Awards/Rites of Passage event and the PSGA sponsored semi-formal to the Honors and Awards/Rites of Passage event followed immediately by the Gala. Combining these two events brought a dramatic increase in participation by student pharmacists, faculty members, staff members, and family/significant others. She was a member of both the Student National Pharmaceutical Association (SNPhA) and the American Pharmacists Association- Academy of Student Pharmacists (APhA-ASP).

Dr. Oyewole was awarded the Walgreens Diversity and Inclusion Excellence Award and the University of Charleston School of Pharmacy Leadership Award for her role as the Pharmacy Student Governance Association President during her days as a student pharmacist.

Dr. Oyewole is originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Biology from the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities. Her professional interests include critical care, emergency medicine, research, and leadership. She is dedicated to tackling the complex challenges faced in the inpatient care setting and gaining unique experiences that will allow her to practice at the top of her license. After completing her PGY2 residency, she would like to secure a position as a Critical Care specialist at a tertiary referral hospital, mentor future pharmacists, and conduct research addressing the healthcare gaps for critically ill patients.

History of Hooding Ceremony and Academic Regalia

The pageantry of commencement has its roots in medieval times, dating to the early tradition of Europe's first universities. In 1895, the United States set for its universities a uniform academic costume code which is reflected in most regalia worn today.

The colorful hood is a special part of academic regalia and denotes scholarly and professional achievements. Academic hoods may be worn by those receiving the bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degrees, however they differ in length and velvet trim width according to degree awarded. The doctoral hood is the longest of the three with the inner lining denoting the institution awarding the degree. The outer velvet trim five inches in width denotes the academic discipline. University of Charleston Doctor of Pharmacy graduate hoods therefore bear an inner lining of maroon and gold with the velvet trim of olive green for pharmacy.

Gowns represent the levels of academic degrees. The doctoral gown worn by most of the faculty and doctoral candidates is faced with velvet panels from the neck to the ankles, fitted with bell-shaped sleeves crossed by three velvet bars. Although the color of the gown in the US is generally black, several universities have their own distinctive colors.

The cap allows for the greatest individual expression. Worn by most is the traditional mortarboard, however velvet tams reserved for the doctoral degree are also commonly seen. The bachelor's and master's tassel match the color of the discipline. A tassel of gold thread is reserved for the doctoral cap however, the discipline color may also adorn the cap.

PHARMACY FELLOWS

The University of Charleston School of Pharmacy medallion is worn by UCSOP Pharmacy Fellows who have successfully completed all activities associated with the UCSOP Fellowship Program. The gold medallion with the university seal on a maroon background and the words Pharmacy Fellow has a maroon and gold ribbon and is worn as part of academic regalia.

The UCSOP Pharmacy Fellowship Program is a highly competitive program that is available to no more than ten students per class, based on their ranking in the top 10% of each entering pharmacy class. The program provides leadership development, advocacy experiences, has research and community service requirements, an annual scholarship, and a required GPA of 3.25, which must be maintained throughout matriculation in the program.
