Mission: To fulfill the mission of the University of Charleston, the mission of the Master of Occupational Therapy Program is to prepare future occupational therapy professionals with a commitment to moral purpose and personal character, who embody and enable purposeful occupational engagement for all people who experience limitations in participation, promote health and well-being across the lifespan and within diverse contexts, develop the knowledge, abilities and character to be life-long learners, use critical thinking and clinical reasoning to create innovative, evidence-based solutions to society's increasingly complex and ever-changing needs, and lead a life rich in productive work and community involvement.

Program Learning Outcomes: Graduates from the Master of Science in Occupational Therapy program at the University of Charleston will:

- Promote the distinct value of occupation and the importance of meaningful occupational
 engagement for those with and without restrictions to enhance the overall health and wellbeing of persons, groups, communities, and populations.
- 2. Analyze the constructs and contexts from the Occupational Therapy Practice Framework (OTPF) that promote and inhibit meaningful occupational engagement to identify the needs of persons, groups, communities, and populations.
- 3. Demonstrate effective critical thinking skills to evaluate evidence, develop innovative practice ideas, use a variety of knowledge sources, and be intellectually flexible to meet the occupational demands of an ever-changing world.
- 4. Use clinical reasoning skills to develop and provide occupational therapy services in current and emerging practice settings that are appropriate, effective, culturally sensitive, theory-driven, evidence-based, client-centered, and target meaningful occupations.
- 5. Reflect on the outcomes of interventions and the therapy process to facilitate professional development and a zest for life-long learning.
- 6. Assess through standardized and non-standardized means the well-being and occupational engagement of oneself and those who may need occupational therapy services to determine unmet needs and develop a plan for intervention or programming that addresses these needs to promote health and well-being, remediation or restoration, health maintenance, disease and injury prevention, and compensation and adaptation for individuals, families, communities, and populations.
- 7. Communicate effectively in both intra-professional and interprofessional contexts to promote the profession and the distinct value of occupation in meeting the needs of those we serve.
- 8. Develop a strong professional identity and deep understanding of the various roles of the occupational therapy practitioner (mentor, educator, practitioner, manager, leader, advocate, consultant, and researcher), increased self-awareness, and increased self-efficacy through consistent self-reflection.
- 9. Obtain the knowledge and skills needed to be a generalist practitioner with a commitment to moral purpose and personal character who provides services and supervision that are ethically sound, within the scope of practice of the profession, and in accordance with the applicable state practice acts.

*The program learning objectives meet the requirements for the Accreditation Council on Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) requirements.

Course Descriptions:

OCTH 522 (3) Occupational Therapy in the Community: Analyzes and evaluates the need and feasibility for occupational therapy services in the community in traditional and emerging practice areas through community-based service projects. Students will explore and analyze the social determinants of health for persons, groups, and populations in the local community and the role of policy and policy development in the promotion of health and well-being.

OCTH 532 (3) Occupational Engagement for Health and Wellness: Analyzes and evaluates the relationship between occupational engagement and occupational balance on health and well-being at a group and community level. Requires students to assess for and use assistive technology and devices, virtual environments, and telehealth as part of the intervention process to promote health and aid in the prevention of disease, illness, and dysfunction.

OCTH 540 (3) Quantitative and Qualitative Research Analysis & Reporting in OT: Inspects quantitative and qualitative methods for data analysis and the written requirements for a research publication. Requires students to explore the use of each type of data analysis in the field of occupational therapy. Students will demonstrate the ability to collect and analyze quantitative and qualitative data and accurately document the methods, results, discussion, and conclusion sections of a research report.

OCTH 570 (1) Graduate Research I: Expands on the work completed in OCSC 470. Students will work with an assigned mentor to formalize the methods and develop any materials needed to complete the institutional review board process (IRB) as required. Students will, upon IRB approval, begin data collection.

OCTH 531 (3) Interventions and Occupational Engagement III: Incorporates findings from the interpretation of standardized and non-standardized assessments into the development of evidence-based, client-centered, occupation-based, theory driven, culturally sensitive intervention plans reflective of current occupational therapy practice for persons, groups, and/or populations across the lifespan with psychosocial and behavioral health deficits. Interventions will address the promotion of health and well-being, remediation or restoration, health maintenance, disease and injury prevention, and compensation and adaptation for individuals, families, communities, and populations.

OCTH 531L (1) Interventions and Occupational Engagement III Lab: Occurs in conjunction with OCTH 531, provides hands-on demonstration and modeling of the procedures for incorporating the interpreted results of various standardized and non-standardized assessments and best evidence into occupational therapy practice for persons, groups, and/or populations across the lifespan with psychosocial and behavioral health deficits. Requires students to engage in simulated case-based activities and practical exams in which they accurately portray the occupational performance deficits associated with the given diagnosis and create effective intervention plans that address promotion, compensation, adaptation, and prevention when playing the role of the therapist.

OCTH 598 (2) Level I Fieldwork III: Consists of an 80-hour rotation at a site that does not provide occupational therapy services. Students will use effective verbal and written communication skills to

analyze and evaluate the setting in which they have been assigned to determine if occupational therapy could play a role and complete other assignments that coincide with current coursework.

OCTH 670 (2) Graduate Research II: Expands on the work completed in OCTH 570. Students will work with an assigned mentor to analyze any data collected. Students will complete the remaining sections of the research paper (results, discussion, & conclusion). Students will choose a format for presentation and/or publication of the research project, prepare and submit the proposal, and present/publish if accepted.

OCTH 698 (24 total, 12 each) Level II Fieldwork I & II: Places students in a full-time (40 hours a week), 12-week clinical rotation at an approved fieldwork site. Students will work with an assigned clinical instructor to provide direct and/or indirect occupational therapy services to the site's targeted audience. Students must complete and pass two level II fieldwork placements to graduate.

OCTH 650 (2) Clinical Reasoning II: Occurs in conjunction with OCTH 698. Facilitates an understanding of the connection between course materials and real-world practice. Requires students to apply information from course materials to clinical experiences, evaluate and analyze chosen evaluation materials, intervention plans, and outcomes of interventions for best practices, develop strategies to promote best practices at the fieldwork site, and navigate ethical dilemmas in the workplace.

OCTH 630 (3) Building a Business – The Occupational Therapy Entrepreneur: Provides students with the knowledge and skills needed to build, market, and manage a business that provides occupational therapy services which promote the distinct value of occupation. Students will explore the various models of service delivery, reimbursement issues, quality management and improvement processes, state and federal requirements, and professional requirements for business development as part of this course.

OCTH 660 (1) Professional Development, Leadership, & Lifelong Learning: Enhances professional development through personal portfolio review, identification of continued or newly discovered areas of weakness and strength, reflection of the therapeutic process, and personal professional development planning for lifelong learning. Explores leadership and the significance of being a leader and active participant in the various organizations that support the profession of occupational therapy and provides students with skills needed for the development of a strong professional identity.

OCTH 651 (2) Clinical Reasoning III: Prepares students for the National Board Certification of Occupational Therapy exam through analysis of the students' critical thinking and critical reasoning skills. This course will provide a wholistic review of information learned in the occupational therapy program. Students will be assessed on this information through exams and clinical simulations.

*All courses must be completed in the program in the sequence in which they are listed on the course schedule as information from previous courses is required to successfully complete proceeding courses.
