THE POWER OF OUR TELEVISION;

WHY A WHITE HOUSE OFFICIAL BECAME A FILMMAKER

For the 2024 Enlightened Living Day, the University of Charleston invited former Obama Administration official, Carrie Twigg, for a Q&A session at UC on "Celebrating Our Similarities and Differences." Twigg offered a unique perspective as someone who had worked as a Special Assistant to President Obama and a Director of Public Engagement for Vice President Biden. During an interview at UC, Twigg talked about her current job as co-founder of Culture House, a media production company for movies and television. To an outsider, it may seem like a random decision; Twigg had only ever held jobs related to politics her entire career. Why did she choose filmmaking whenever her job at the

When asked about her career decision, Twigg said without any hesitation, "We elected a reality star president."

White House ended?

Twigg's reply clarified the focus of her work throughout her career.
Twigg had a desire to be involved in the political system since she was young, and she was motivated to do this by realizing the government's power over people's lives.

"My mom is a social worker.... and that's what she was experiencing as a social worker who was deciding whether or not a parent gets to keep their kid, and she's like, 'We're sitting in a room, deciding how people get to live their lives, and that's a huge responsibility," Twigg said.



Twigg first found work in politics at the state level with the Ohio Democratic Party, and then she worked on Obama's first presidential campaign. That propelled her into a job at the White House after Obama won the 2008 election. She described the job for the White House as tough because of the distance it put between her and the people she helped govern.

Twigg said that despite the fact people join the White House because they desire to do public service, ironically, because the job is at the end of the decision-making process, they are far removed from the people they wanted to serve. Her desire to serve, influence, and change the public motivated Twigg to enter politics, but it was the 2016 election that made her decide the best way to achieve that goal was media.

"Whether you agree with him or not... without The Apprentice, the odds of Donald Trump being president are, I think, radically slim. And not being more in touch with the power of our televisions to determine our political outcomes, I think, has been a mistake, particularly on behalf of the Left," Twigg said.

Twigg talked about an example of when she realized television had power over the population back in the White House. One of the creators of the show, CSI, had visited the White House and, during his visit, revealed there had been something close to a 500 percent increase in the number of students taking forensic sciences after the show began to air. This discussion made Twigg realize the importance of TV in modern America.

I got clued into how powerful TV actually is. 2016 really, as someone who hadn't watched much television, made me realize, 'Oh, I thought the place you changed the world had marble floors and columns and was in Washington D.C.... the place you change the world is in people's living rooms on their television sets.'"

Twigg concluded the interview by talking about the kinds of projects she and her company, Culture House, are working on releasing over the next year. One project will be a three-part series on black Twitter, which will premiere at SXSW in Texas in the spring. Another project will be making an entertaining series on climate change-related behavior issues.

Her motivation in politics and media is founded on the same core idea.

"I'm someone who has always been fascinated by America, and who cares a lot about America... so I believe in really doing my best to improve what the gift of being a citizen of this country or improve this country in exchange for being a citizen of it." Twigg said. "That shapes everything I do now... I worked at the White House because I wanted to make the country better, and I make TV because I want to make the country better."

The i3 Innovation Showcase:

The i3 Innovation Showcase is the largest collegiate innovation competition in West Virginia, in which students compete in an attempt to win prizes of up to \$1500 for first place.

i3: Ideas, Innovation, Invention


i3 (standing for Ideas, Innovation, and Invention) is dedicated to sharing innovative ideas, products, services, research, case studies, and works of art, according to the University of Charleston's official page on the competition. There are four different competitive categories: Innovative Product, Process, or Service Project; Innovative Work of Art, Design, Performance, or Creation; and Research and Case Study.

As for the top three entries from each separate category, each of them will receive a prize of \$350 for making it to the final round. The winner for each category receives \$1500. An additional \$300 prize awaits the finalist with the top overall score from the judges across all categories.

When asked his reasons for entering the competition, Boblits said, "i3 is an opportunity for me to make my ideas a reality. It gives me an opportunity to push myself to create something that people would enjoy," adding that it provides valuable business experience that will help him significantly in the field.



With the embers of i3 Innovation Showcase lighting up, some students have already expressed their interest in registering and participating this year. Kelton Boblits, who has participated in i3 in the past, has registered already. Boblits took part in i3 2023 with Emily Thomas in the Product or Service category, scoring 2nd place with their project, "Mushroom Aquahydroponic Garden."



Boblits will be entering two different categories this year: the Arts category, specializing in music, and the Research category, delving into concepts of Appalachian identity.

Zachary Newsome who has not participated in i3 before, is excited about registering for the competition, saying it is an "opportunity to display my ideas and talents, an opportunity to win money, and a great addition to a resume."

Newsome plans to enter two categories: Products and Services, with a foldable solar panel for a windshield to collect solar energy; and in the Arts category, he plans to enter a poem about the topic of environmentalism.

The first round of judging will be conducted on March 8 by a panel of external judges. The top three contestants from each category will move on to the final round, in which the contestants will attend a live, in-person event on April 8.

With the emergence of innovative ideas and products in the i3 Showcase in 2024, there is bound to be an abundance of celebrated products, arts, research, and other developments.

WEST VIRGINIA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRAS FINAL CONCERTS FOR 2023-2024

The West Virginia Symphony Orchestra is putting on performances at the Clay Center for the Arts and Sciences in Charleston to conclude their 2023-2024 Season. The WVSO, founded in 1939, is composed of an assortment of string, wind, and percussion players that typically play classical and orchestral music. Every year, the WVSO performs with artists of different backgrounds and music styles, and this year is no exception. As of February 2024, the WVSO has six more concerts planned to finish its 2023-2024 music season.

According to the WVSO website, the first concert after February for the WVSO is called "A New World of Music" and will be held at the Clay Center on March 9th at 7:30 p.m. It will feature several works, including Duke Ellington's "Black, Brown, and Beige Suite," and Saint-Saëns' Piano Concerto No. 2 played by renowned pianist Sara Davis Buechner. The concert will conclude with a performance of Antonín Dvořák's Symphony No. 9.



The next WVSO show is "Louis Armstrong and Friends" and will be performed twice, once on March 23rd at 7:30 p.m. at the Clay Center and again on March 24th at 2:30 p.m. at Blennerhassett Middle School. Carmen Bradford and Bryon Stripling, two jazz artists, will be playing some of Loius Armstrong's greatest hits, including "What a Wonderful World."

"A Night at The Opera" is the next concert scheduled for this WVSO season. It will be held at the Clay Center on April 13th at 7:30 p.m. and will begin with Richard Strauss's Rosenkavalier Suite. The concert will then climax with a performance of another Strauss piece, Vier Letzte Lieder TrV 296, by internationally recognized soprano, Carline Waugh. The concert will conclude with a selection of "Choruses from Famous Operas" featuring the WVSO Chorus.

The Season will end with two performances of a show entitled "A Grand Finale!" The concert will start with Matt Jackfert's "Foggy Moon Over the Gorge," performed by the WVSO and the West Virginia Youth Symphony. Then, the WVSO will perform Florence Price's Violin Concerto No. 1 in D Major, featuring violinist Melissa White. The concert will then conclude with a performance Mussorgsky' piano suite "Pictures at an Exhibition." The concert will be held at the Clay Center on May 4th at 7:30 p.m. and at the Blennerhassett Middle School the following day at 2:30 p.m.



The ballpark never fails to come up with new ideas to spice up games, such as special themed days, on-field games, and giveaways to keep the fans engaged and entertained.






Step 1 – Establish a Foundation

Upcoming Spring Movies!

When it comes to movies, the first half of 2024 has a lot of heavily anticipated movies coming out. The genres vary from superhero to sci-fi to horror, which gives the viewers a wide variety of films to choose from.

The first movie I will be covering is the star-studded spy action comedy, Argylle. This movie is about a novelist (played by Bryce Dallas Howard) whose plot for her new espionage novels uncannily matches the actions of an underground crime syndicate. This draws their attention to her, and it's up to an undercover spy (played by Sam Rockwell) to save her. Directed by Matthew Vaughn and starring Henry Cavil, John Cena, Dua Lipa, Bryan Cranston, and Samuel L. Jackson, it was released on February 2, and it gets a 72% audience rating on Rotten Tomatoes.

The newest addition to the Sony Spider franchise, Madame Web, is a suspense thriller based on the origin story of Spider Man side character, Cassandra Webb, who goes by the alias Madame Webb. Cassandra Webb is played by Fifty Shades of Grey star, Dakota Johnson, and is set in its own standalone universe outside of the main Spider Man timeline. Also starring Sydney Sweeney, Celeste O'Connor, Tahar Rahim, Emma Roberts, and Adam Scott, it was released on February 14.

The highly regarded Blumhouse Studios is set to release a new horror flick, Imaginary. Imaginary is an original horror film directed by Jeff Wadlow that follows a woman (played by DeWanda Wise) who moves back into her childhood home with her family. While there, her stepdaughter (played by Pyper Braun) finds a stuffed bear in the basement. She became attached to the bear and the bear mystically compels her to partake in increasingly dangerous games, which causes trouble for her and her family. The film is set to be released on March 8.

At this point, the Kung Fu Panda franchise is no stranger to kids and families all over the world. With three films under their belt, the new Kung Fu Panda 4 is set to be the continuation of the highly regarded trilogy. Jack Black returns as the voice of the beloved chubby, but fierce, Dragon Warrior, Po. In this film, directed by Mike Mitchell, Po faces off against a chameleon foe while searching the land for a new Dragon Warrior to take his place. Starring legendary actors Jackie Chan, Lucy Liu, and Angelina Jolie, it is also set to premiere on March 8.

Save Coonskin Park

Residents Come Together to Preserve Coonskin Park and Attempt to Halt Plans for Airport Expansion

Coonskin Park, a beloved recreational area in Charleston, has found itself at the center of controversy since plans to expand WV International Yeager Airport were proposed. The expansion will aim to boost tourism in Charleston, generate more job opportunities, and add improvements to the airport infrastructure.



"This plan would generate approximately 7,900 jobs including direct, indirect, and induced," said Yeager Airport authorities. "The improvements will lead to thousands of out of state visitors leading to additional hotel and restaurant jobs and a steady stream of park revenue."



Recognizing the impact the expansion will have on Coonskin Park, many have voiced their concerns regarding the loss of trails and open green space. Charleston residents have utilized various platforms, such as petitions and public meetings, to express their views and to advocate for the preservation of the park's integrity.

According to SaveCoonskinPark.com, Yeager International Airport has proposed a runway extension that would "destroy approximately 400 acres of Coonskin Park, including all the upper shelters and hiking trails and would forever bury Coonskin Branch under hundreds of feet of rubble."

The controversy over the expansion of the Yeager airport and its potential impact on Coonskin Park is a conflict between economic development and environmental preservation. Though there are many benefits to expanding the Yeager airport, such as more job opportunities and a longer, more stable runway to handle bigger planes, the compromise the expansion could have on Coonskin Park would be substantial.
